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Nebraskans for Research Salute James Armitage, M.D. at Fifth Annual Tribute Luncheon



Nebraskans for Research will salute an internationally known cancer physician at its annual Tribute Luncheon on Monday, April 23, 2007. James O. Armitage, M.D., The Joe Shapiro Professor of Medicine in Oncology/ Hematology and former Chairman of the Department of Internal Medicine and Dean of the College of Medicine at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, is known throughout the world

for his expertise in the research and treatment of lymphoma and bone marrow transplantation.

The fifth annual Tribute Luncheon will be held from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Happy Hollow Club, 1710 South 105th Street in Omaha.

A 1973 graduate of the UNMC College of Medicine, Dr. Armitage completed his internship and residency training at UNMC and an oncology/hematology fellowship at the University of Iowa. At the University of Iowa he developed the bone marrow transplant program and served as its director from 1980 to 1982. He joined UNMC in 1982. In addition to his teaching, research and clinical duties, Dr. Armitage held a series of leadership positions at UNMC, including chief of the section of oncology/hematology, vice chair of the Department of Internal Medicine, chair of the Department of Internal Medicine and Dean of the College of Medicine from 2000 to 2003.

Dr. Armitage's research has focused on the management and understanding of lymphomas and the use of bone marrow transplantation in the treatment of these disorders. He has been the

author of more than 500 scientific articles, book chapters, and monographs, and the editor of several textbooks in the field of internal medicine and oncology/hematology. He has developed an international reputation for both his clinical research and patient care.

Dr. Armitage's work has been recognized by numerous awards including election as a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of the United Kingdom, the San Salvatore Foundation Research Award from Lugano, Switzerland, the Richard and Hilda Rosenthal Foundation Award from the American Association of Cancer Research, election as a Fellow of the American Associate for the Advancement of Science, the Sixth Claude-Jacquillat Award for Achievement in Clinical Oncology in Paris, the Avi Cinna Memorial Award in Cairo, Egypt, the Heath Memorial Award from the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, and the Outstanding Research and Creativity Award from the University of Nebraska. He has been elected President of the American Society of Clinical Oncology and the American Society of Blood and Marrow Transplantation, and was elected a member of the Association of American Physicians. He was appointed by President Bill Clinton to the National Cancer Advisory Board.

New Stem Cell Research Funding Report

A recent Center for American Progress event addressed the state of stem cell research funding. Speakers included Iowa Senator Tom Harkin and Wisconsin Governor Jim Doyle. Released at the event was the report Too Much to Ask: The States Simply Cannot Make Up for Federal Inaction on Stem Cell Research. It notes that states have promised more than \$3.65 Billion for stem cell research over an extended timeframe, but most of that will go toward the necessary infrastructure and training. While selected states are strongly supporting stem cell research, they cannot match funding power of the National Institutes of Health. The report warns that federal funding for embryonic stem cell research must be expanded for the U.S. to remain a leader in the field. To read the full report go to www.americanprogress.org.
